- a. global, multinational organization
- b. isolationist U.S. did not join
- c. new British and French "mandates" (colonies/peripheries) established from Ottoman Empire
- d. Universal Declaration of Human Rights built on western Enlightenment ideals, but applied in principal to all peoples and states implicitly condemned western imperialism
- e. created tension between national sovereignty (independent state actions) and international cooperation
- f. first use of peacekeepers and refugee camps after Israel independence
- g. seriously weakened by lack of enforcement mechanism in reaction to military aggression by Japan against N.E. China (Manchuria) and Italy against Ethiopia
- h. Japan, Italy, and Germany left when criticized for military aggression
- i. established after a world war to prevent future wars between states (countries)
- j. lost credibility when peacekeepers did not effectively resist genocides in Bosnia and Rwanda
- k. International Criminal Court formed to bring alleged genocidal dictators to trial
- I. 66 peacekeeping missions in its history, 2,918 peacekeepers killed in missions
- m. U.S. and U.S.S.R. vetoes supporting allies prevented effective Security Council actions during Cold War
- n. General Assembly Millennium Summit supported sustainable development and ending world poverty as highest priorities
- o. included five "great powers" with Security Council vetoes for pragmatic effectiveness
- p. General Assembly and Security Council actions required unanimous votes
- q. focused on peaceful, international cooperation rather than great power alliances
- r. Security Council decisions binding on all member states (agreed to before states join)
- s. U.S.S.R. prevented from joining, initially
